Thanks to the foresight of community leaders, the City of Hoisington launched a community endowment in early 2020. By working with the Golden Belt Community Foundation, the City was able to create the City of Hoisington Quality of Life Endowment Fund with an initial gift of \$147,500. Over the past five years, the endowment has grown to more than \$1 million in assets and will provide a perpetual source of funding for quality of life projects in the Hoisington community. The endowment fund has helped to fund improvements to two of our community parks, some critical equipment for our water and water infrastructure and improvements to the City Hall gymnasium.

The park improvements include a new playscape at Bicentennial Park, two zip line structures at Heritage Park, a new swing set and additional play equipment at Heritage Park and a gaga ball pit is going to be installed this spring with proceeds from the community endowment and grants from the Golden Belt Community Foundation.

Mayor Chris Kinman had the following things to say about the City of Hoisington Quality of Life Endowment, "The endowment will help to fund quality of life projects for generations to come." He also shared, "As the endowment grows, so does the ability to enhance our community."
